Course Description: COMM 1311 is designed to showcase the communication studies discipline by introducing basic human communication principles in a variety of contexts including interpersonal, small group, and public speaking. In this ONLINE course, students will learn how to adapt and deliver verbal and nonverbal messages to communicate effectively with family, friends, and coworkers. In short, COMM 1311 will prepare students to be effective communicators in their personal and professional lives.

COMM 1311 Learning Objectives

After completing COMM 1311, students will be able to:

1. Understand and apply the five principles of human communication.
2. Value and recognize the five principles of human communication during personal and professional conversations.
3. Analyze and manage interpersonal conflict effectively.
4. Engage in effective group/team communication.

6. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of information (i.e., concepts, principles, theories, critical issues, problems and behaviors).
7. Demonstrate effective research skills using professional journal articles, and other academic or substantial, credible sources.
8. Use discipline-appropriate technology applications, such as library databases, computer applications, Internet research, non-print media, multi-media applications, desktop publishing,

Blackboard, course-based electronic communication, etc.) in preparation and presentation of course projects.

Motivation Score. Good attendance contributes to a positive learning environment, and you can't do your best in this course if you do not participate ONLINE. Since we know your objective is to increase your learning, our assumption is that you will participate ONLINE. You will receive a grade for your motivation based on your participation ONLINE. Worth 50 points.

Reflection Papers: After reading the assigned texts, please complete to the reflection questions. The questions are intended to get you to synthesize, evaluate, and extend your knowledge and understanding of the materials you have read. To receive credit for class participation, you must provide a personal response to the question/s. Please note that both quantity and quality are important when completing this assignment. Five reflection papers worth 20 points each.

Reading Quizzes: You are expected to read assigned materials and to be prepared for quizzes. Reading quizzes are short quizzes over the assigned reading that will be a regular part of this course. Five reading quizzes worth 20 points each.

Discussion Board Activity: Participation is required. In addition, feedback to 2 or 3 classmates about their discussion board posting is also required. Responses must be complete sentences and at least 2 paragraphs long. Two Discussion Board activities worth 25 points each.

Examinations. You will take two ONLINE exams. Each exam is multiple choice format, objective based and timed. Study guide questions for each chapter will be provided. Answering these study guide questions as you work through the chapters will prepare you for the exams. Each exam includes 50 multiple-choice items with each item being worth two points.

Completion of Assignments. It is assumed that you will turn your assignments in on time.
