Course Description

This is an advanced course concentrating on the history of Balkans. The course will cover key political, social and economic developments in the Balkans from the Congress of Vienna to the end of Cold War. The course content will cover the Ottoman rule in the Balkans along with the nineteenth-century Ottoman reforms, emerging Balkan nationalisms and the great powers' struggle in the region. The nation-state formation, Balkanization and the Congress of Berlin, the Balkan Wars and World War I are main topics of the first part. The second part will cover the Balkans during the interwar period, the formation of Yugoslavia and WWII and Cold War period. *Hist 3300 is a prerequisite for this course for only History majors.*

Course Objectives

- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to identify in written form main systems, events and people that shaped the modern Eastern European history.
- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to improve their ability to examine current issues critically from a historical perspective and argue effectively about major issues in Eastern European history.
- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to identify and critique historical interpretations and analyze issues in their historical context.
- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to analyze primary and secondary sources and develop written arguments critically about the reciprocal influence of Eastern European cultures, values, and ideas.
- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to demonstrate knowledge of (TEKS) Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for 7th – 12th grade (Social Studies).

Course Requirements & Assignments

2 Group Discussions: You will receive a total of 2 group discussion assignments. I will post questions from the assigned reading of that week/module. You will complete the assigned readings, answer the questions and submit them on Blackboard Discussion Forum. You will also engage in discussing the subject by providing feedback to other classmates' posts. You will receive at least five days to complete each assignment.

You will find two types of discussion forums in the course Blackboard site:

Assignment Forums: These forums are related to collaborative and discussion assignments, as described in Learning Module sections. My role in discussion forums is that of a facilitator. I will occasionally correct misconceptions and/or redirect conversations that need redirecting. I may also post comments following the completion of discussion indicating my general impressions of the comments and conclusions.

General Help Discussion Forum: Post any questions or comments you may have about course technical issues to this forum. If you have a question about course content or mechanics, I encourage you to post it to the General Help discussion forums. Doing so gives all in the course an opportunity to help one another and allows everyone to benefit from answers to your questions. If your question is a personal one, you can email me separately.

2 Assignments: You will receive a total of 2 individual assignments. You will complete the assigned reading, answer the questions and submit them on Blackboard. Most of the assignments will require reading and analyzing primary documents. You will read the document and answer the questions. Analyzing primary documents requires background knowledge of the subject. You are advised to read the related section on your textbook.

2 Quizzes: There will be two short online quizzes. You will take them on Blackboard.

1 Midterm Examination: The exam will cover all material presented during the first half of the course, including readings and notes. You will take the exam on Blackboard.

1 Analytical Essay: During the semester you will write one analytical essay. Essay-writing guidelines and all related handouts will be posted on Blackboard.

1 Final Examination: The exam will cover all material presented during the second half of the course, including readings and notes. You will take the exam on Blackboard.

Attendance and Participation: This is an online course. There will not be regular scheduled meetings. Online courses require your active participation. Here are some tips for success:

- In discussion forums, you learn from one another by posing questions, justifying your comments, and providing multiple perspectives. When you prepare for discussions through thoughtful reflection, you contribute to your own successful learning experience as well as to the experience of your peers.
- Log in to the course frequently (at least several times per week for long semesters and daily for summer sessions) and check the announcements. This will keep you apprised of any course updates, progress in discussions, assignment information, and messages requiring immediate attention.
- Failure to access Blackboard may cause you to miss an assignment or an exam.
- Be aware of and keep up with the Course Schedule in the Syllabus.

Course Drops: If you miss two consecutive assignments in a row, you may be dropped from the course. According to UTRGV policy, students may drop any class without penalty earning a grade of DR until the official drop date. Following that date, students must be assigned a letter grade and can no longer drop the class. Students considering dropping the class should be aware of the “3-peat rule” and the “6-drop” rule so they can recognize how dropped classes may affect their academic success. The 6-drop rule refers to Texas law that dictates that undergraduate students may not drop more than six courses during their undergraduate career. Courses dropped at other Texas public higher education institutions will count toward the six-course drop limit. The 3-peat rule refers to additional fees charged to students who take the same class for the third time.

Communication and Netiquette: Students in online courses should use the email system in Blackboard Learn. I will answer all emails within TWO BUSINESS days. Per UTRGV policy, all email communication between the UTRGV faculty and staff and students must be conducted through the students' official University supplied UTRGV email account. Therefore, please use your UTRGV assigned email for any correspondence with UTRGV faculty and staff. Other emails may be blocked by the spam filter. You are responsible for the consequences of an undelivered or delayed email that are blocked by the spam filter. For online courses students should use the email system in Blackboard.

All students must have adequate writing skills to communicate content in a professional and concise manner. Students must be proficient in their written presentations including strategies for developing ideas, citing scholarly references, writing style, wording, phrasing, and using language conventions. Students must follow Chicago Manual of Style guidelines, use non-racist and non-sexist language, and include sufficient references to support their thesis and ideas in the assignments.

Late Work and Make Ups: Quizzes, Midterm and Final Exam will remain on Blackboard until their due date. Once they are removed from Blackboard you will not have access to exams. Make-up exams will be given only if you provide a documented emergency situation that had prevented you from completing the exam on time. No make-up exam will be given online. If you miss an exam, you must come to my office to take your exam. There is no make up for missed group discussions and assignments. No extensions are allowed for late essays except in extreme circumstances, which MUST be documented.

Incomplete Policy: Under emergency/special circumstances, students may petition for an incomplete grade. An incomplete will only be assigned if you have a documented emergency. All incomplete course assignments must be completed within 30 days.
